Multiple Perspectives at Piti Guns Teacher Answer Sheet

1. Examine the map on the left. Why do you think Japanese soldiers decided to place the guns at this location in Piti?

The guns were mounted at least 70 m in elevation, which was high ground, and were placed in preparation for the impending American invasion. The guns were intended to be used primarily against ships and landing craft.

- 2. Three large Japanese coastal defense guns can be found on this trail. How large are the guns?
